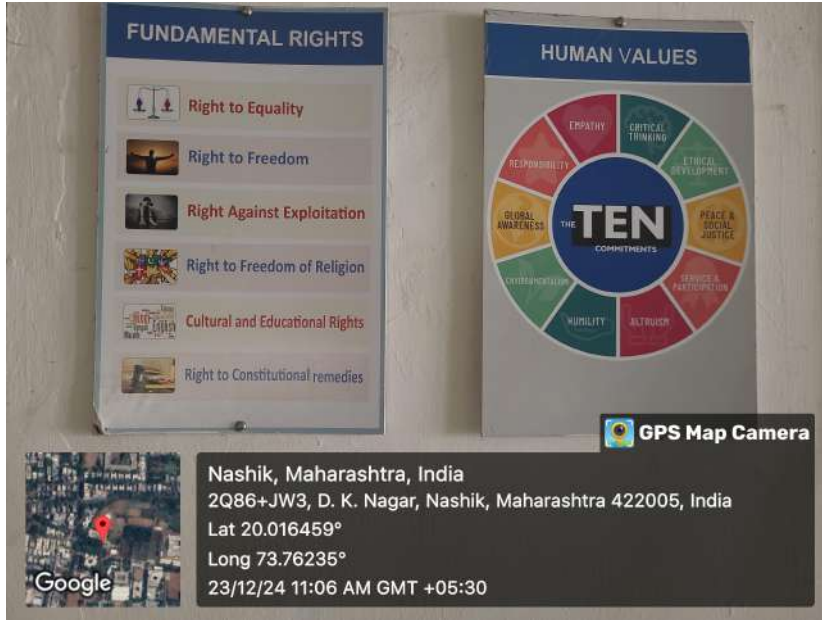

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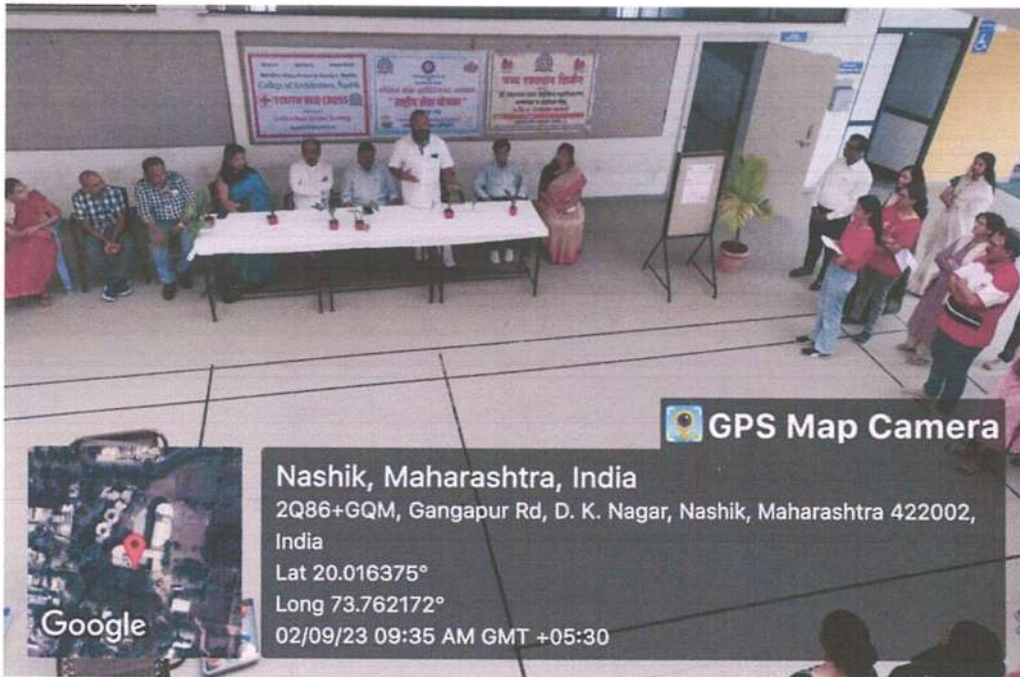

Adjoining the village, Reliance Pharma Plant, HP oil refinery and many other small industries to suffice the needs of these industries are under construction. This shall result in a haphazard encroachment on the village. To avoid such unplanned growth, the Akrale village authorities approached our institute to propose a masterplan for Akrale. This project was then taken up by the Fourth Year B.Arch. students as a part of their Urban Studies-I studio.

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<p>Brief about the Program (Activity/Event)</p>	<p>The activity was carried out in the following stages:</p> <p>Stage 1 – Visit to Akrale Village</p> <p>Stage 2 – Preparation of Assessment Report</p> <p>The entire batch was divided I groups to work on Base Maps, Topography, Impact of Industrial Development, Existing features & landmarks, Standards for landuse, Population projection & socio-cultural study, Regional plan & surrounding connectivity, Current issues & needs of town. All this data was then compiled to prepare the Assessment Report. It became a ready reference to facilitate the planning process</p> <p>Stage 3 – Initiating the planning process</p> <p>The students were divided in groups of 10 each to work on the masterplan so that we shall have 8 options to present the Akrale officials. Pin-up juries were organised to review the concept & basic planning.</p> <p>Stage 4 – Jury with the experts</p> <p>To review the students work practicing urban designer from the industry, Ar. Kuldeep Chavre along with Dr. Prajakta Baste were invited. The students received practical feedback from him, which further helped them to refine the layouts.</p> <p>Stage 5 – Presentation to the Stakeholders from Akrale & Sahyadri Farms officials</p> <p>All the 8 groups presented their layouts to the stakeholders from Akrale; Mr. Sandeep Kendele (Up-sarpanch), Mr. Bapusaheb Gaikwad, Mr. Anil Gade and officials from Sahtadri Farms; Mr. Vilas Shinde (Director), Mr. Suresh Nakhate. They reviewed all the masterplans and were overwhelmed by the students' work. They</p>
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	have further invited the students to present their layouts to the villagers. This really encouraged the students to work ahead in the near future.
Remarks	This activity enabled the students to understand the actual process of urban planning with the various stakeholders & urban planners. It also helped them know the opportunities for them as professionals in the near future. Students work with utmost dedication within the given time frame for such real-time problems.

1) Explain relation of Government and Governance.

- a) Government is the formal institute and structure through which a country or community is ruled. It includes the executive, legislative and judiciary and various administrative agencies.
- b) The processes, systems and practices through which power and responsibilities are executed and decisions are made and implemented, involving a range of actors beyond just government.
- c) Government refers specifically to the state and its formal institutions.
Governance include actors as well as business non-governmental organisations (NGOs), community group and international bodies.
- d) Government includes elected officials, public servant and state institutions.
Broader concept encompassing not only government institute but also the role of private sector civil society and others.

2) Write short note on:

a) Economic Justice :

→ The study of economics involves examining how individuals firms, and government make decisions to allocate limited resources to meet various needs and desires.

It divided into key areas including microeconomics which focuses on individual and firm behaviour and market dynamics and macroeconomics, which looks at aggregate economic indicator like GDP, inflation and unemployment to understand broader economics trends and policies. Additionally, economics explores different economic systems, such as capitalism and socialism and investigates international economic development economics and behavioral economics.

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b) Political Justice ②

→ Political Justice refers to the fair and equitable development of political power, rights and responsibilities within a society. It involves ensuring that all individuals have equal access to political participation, legal protections and opportunities to influence decision making processes. Political justice is closely linked to the principles of democracy, human rights and the rule of law, emphasizing the importance of transparency, accountability and inclusivity of government.

c) Social Justice

→ Social Justice refers to the fair and equitable distribution of resources, opportunity and privileges within a society. It aims to eliminate social inequalities and ensure that all individuals regardless of the background have equal access to education, healthcare, employment and other essential services. Social Justice is rooted in the principles of human rights and dignity, advocating for the protections and empowerment of marginalized and disadvantaged groups.

3) Explain amendment 73rd and 74th of constitution in short.

a) Amendment 73 :

- Education funding intended to provide additional funding for public education in certain states.
- Taxation, typically involves increases in taxes on corporations and high income earners to generate revenue for education.
- May include earmarking funds for specific educational purpose like teachers salaries, classroom resources of school infrastructure.



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b) Amendment 74 :

③

- Aims to protect private property rights against government actions that reduce property value or restrict use without just compensation.
- Often framed as preventing regulatory 'takings' where government regulations significantly diminish property value.
- Provides property owners with legal recourse to seek compensation if they believe their property rights have been infringed upon by the government's actions.

④ 4) What are 6 major challenges to democracy and how we must face them?

→ a) Political Polarization :

- Deep ideological divides can lead to gridlock, decreased political cooperation and increased social tension.
- Encourage dialogue and compromise, promote bipartisan initiatives and educate citizens on the importance of understanding diverse perspective.

b) Erosion of Trust in Institution :

- Declining trust in government and public institutes undermines democratic legitimacy and efficiency.
- Increase transparency, hold institutes accountable and ensure that public officials act with integrity and responsiveness to citizen's need.

c) Corruption and Inefficiency :

- Corruption and bureaucratic inefficiency weaken the rule of law and hinder fair governance.
- Implement strict -corruption measures, streamline bureaucratic processes and enhance oversight and enforcement mechanism.

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④

d) Threats to Free press :

- Suppression of independent media and the spread of misinformation and fake news distort public discourse and informed decision making.
- Protect press function freedom, promote media literacy and support fact-checking organisation to ensure access to accurate information.

e) Economic inequality :

- Growing of economic disparities can lead to social unrest and undermine the principle of equal opportunity.
- Implement policies that promote economic equality, such as progressive taxation, social safety nets and equal access to quality education and healthcare.

f) Political Apathy and low participation :

- Voters apathy and disengagement reduce democratic participation and weaken representative democracy.
- Encourage civic education, make voting more accessible and promote the importance of civic engagement and participation in democratic processes.

5) How inclusion and exclusion affect government?

- When all groups, including minorities and marginalised communities are represented in political institution, it ensures that their interests and needs are considered in decision making.
- If certain groups are excluded from political representation, their voices and concerns are not heard. This can lead to policies that favour dominant group. This can lead to further marginalising those who are already disadvantaged.





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6) What does preamble of constitution says to secure to all citizens? ⑤

→ The preamble of constitution outlines the fundamental values and guiding principles that the document aims to uphold. It sets the tone of entire constitution and reflects the core aspirations of the nation. The Preamble to the constitution of India aims to secure to all its citizens justice, equality and fraternity. These principles reflect the commitment to creating a just, free, equal and unified society, serving as foundation for the value of provisions enshrined in Indian constitution.

7) What does preamble of constitution says to promote to all?

→ The preamble of the constitution states that it aims to promote fraternity assuring the dignity of individual and the unity of the Nation. This means fostering a sense of brotherhood among all citizens, ensuring that each individual is treated with dignity and respect and maintaining the unity and integrity of the nation.

8) Why decentralization is necessary?

→ Decentralization is necessary for several key reasons. It improves governance by bringing decision-making closer to the people, allowing local government to be more responsive to the unique needs and preference of their communities.

This proximity fosters better governance, as decisions can be tailored to local engagement and empowering communities to have a say in matters that directly affect their lives.

9) What is decentralization?

→ Decentralization is a process of redistributing or dispersing functions, powers, people or things away from a central location or authority. In governance, it involves transferring decision-making authority, administrative function and fiscal responsibilities from central government to local or regional governments. This aims to improve efficiency, responsiveness, and accountability by bringing government closer to the people it serves.

It can enhance governance by making it more transparent, accountable and responsive to the needs of local population, thereby fostering greater public trust and participation.

10) What were the two traditional institutes of local self government?

- a) Panchayat Raj (India)
b) Town meeting (US)

The Panchayati Raj system in India and the Town meeting system in US are two traditional institutes.

Panchayati Raj empowers rural communities through tiers like Gram Panchayat, Panchayat Samiti and Zilla Parishad, while the Town meeting system enables direct citizen participation in policies & budget decision enhancing transparency and accountability locally.

Both are pillars of local self government. Panchayati Raj provides a platform for rural communities to address local issues through various tiers, while the Town meeting system allow residents to directly influence policies & budgets, promoting community involvement.

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11) What are directive principals? ⑦

→ Directive principals of the State Policy are the guidelines or principles given in Constitution of India to the central and state government, aiming to establish social and economic democracy in the country. They are non judicial in nature, meaning that they are not enforceable by any court of law, unlike fundamental rights.

Instead, they serve as moral and political directive for the governance of the country.

12) What legacy constitution had?

→ The Indian constitution has its roots in the legacy of the British Government of India Act 1935. This act was the ~~leg~~ longest passed by the British government, with 321 sections and 10 schedules.

It drew content from four sources:

- a) Report of the Simon commission
- b) Third round table meeting
- c) White Paper of 1933
- d) Reports of the Joint select Committee.

13) What are fundamental rights? enlist them.

→ Fundamental rights are a group of rights recognized by a high degree of protection from government encroachment. These rights are specifically identified in a constitution or have been found under due process of law. They are considered fundamental because they are essential for individual liberty and are beyond the reach of the political process.

- Objective - Fundamental right aim to ensure individual liberties and equality, while Directive Principles aim to achieve socio-economic justice and welfare.

15) Why every citizen should know directive principle of constitution?

→ Every citizen should know the directive principles of the constitution because they,

- a) Guide governance : These principles guide the government in formulating policies and laws to ensure social and economic justice.

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b) Promote welfare : They aim to promote the welfare of the people, ensuring a just and equitable society. ⑨

c) Fundamental in Governance : Although non-enforceable, they are considered fundamental in governance of the country.

d) Influence Policy-making : They influence the formulation of policies and laws by the government.

16) Which factors affect efficacy of decentralization?

→ The efficacy of decentralization is influenced by a multitude of factors. The size of operation plays a significant role, as larger organisations tend to decentralize more due to need for coordination and decision making at different levels.

The cost and risk decisions by delegating routine decisions to lower levels. Top management philosophy is another crucial factor, as the attitude and philosophy of executive significantly impact the extent of decentralization.

17) Why induction of Panchayati Raj is important in our democracy?

→ Panchayati Raj strengthens grassroots democracy by decentralization power and decision-making, fostering active citizens participation and civic engagement in local governance processes.

Panchayats empowers local communities by providing them with a platform to voice their concern, participate in decision-making and take ownership of local development initiatives, promoting self reliance and community development.

18) What is participatory democracy ?

→ Participatory democracy is a type of democracy where citizens have the power to make decisions either directly or indirectly regarding laws and matters of state. It is a mechanism that combines elements of direct and representative democracy, where citizens participate in policy-making and politicians are responsible for implementing those decisions.

Key features :

- a) Active citizen engagement
- b) Decentralization of Power

→ The history of Panchayati raj in India can be divided into several periods :

- a) The concept of Panchayat Raj originated in the Vedic Era, where the word 'Panchayatan' referred to a group of five persons including a spiritual man.
- b) Gradually, the concept of a spiritual man in these group vanished.
- c) Vedic Era : Origin of Panchayat concept.
- d) Epic Era : Village self government with units of 10, 20, 100 and 1000 villages
- e) Ancient Period : Local bodies free from royal interference.
- f) Medieval Period : Village had autonomy but casteism and feudalism eroded it.
- g) British Period : Anatomy lost, with elected representative introduced.

- Empowers marginalized groups and strengthens participatory democracy.

Exclusion:

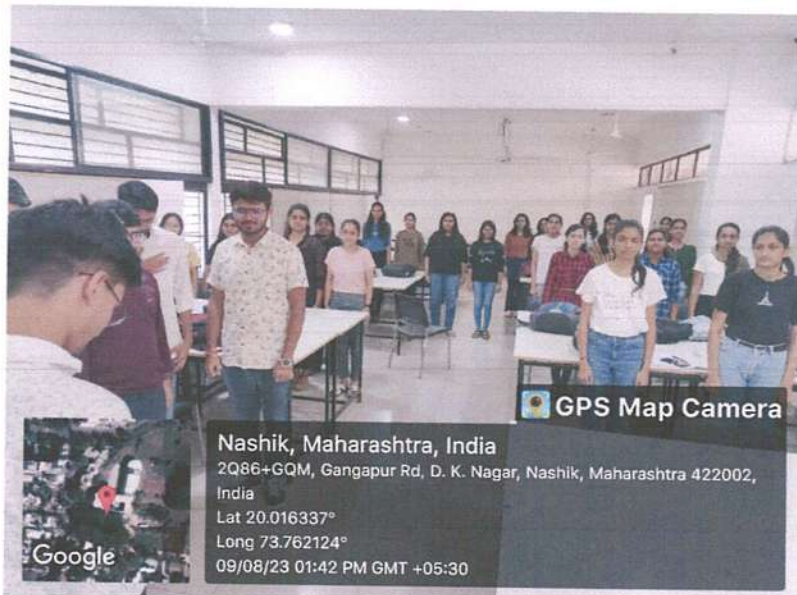
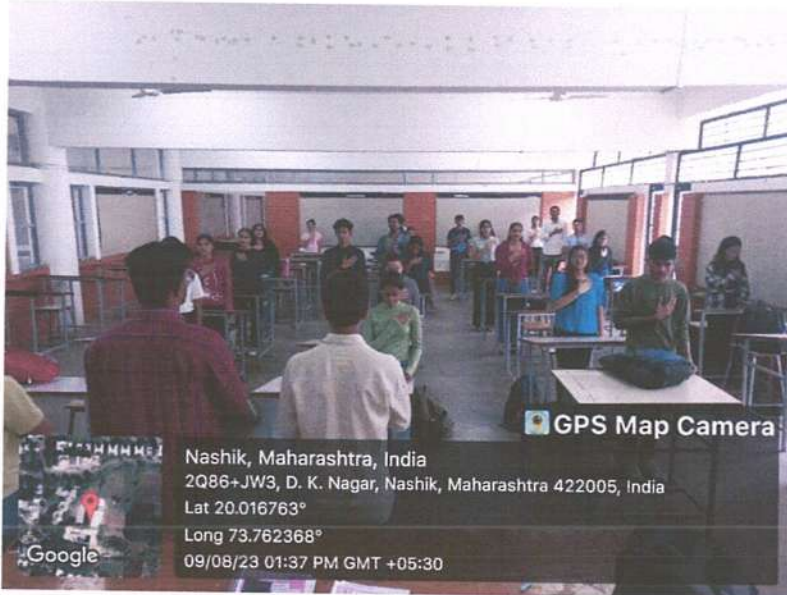

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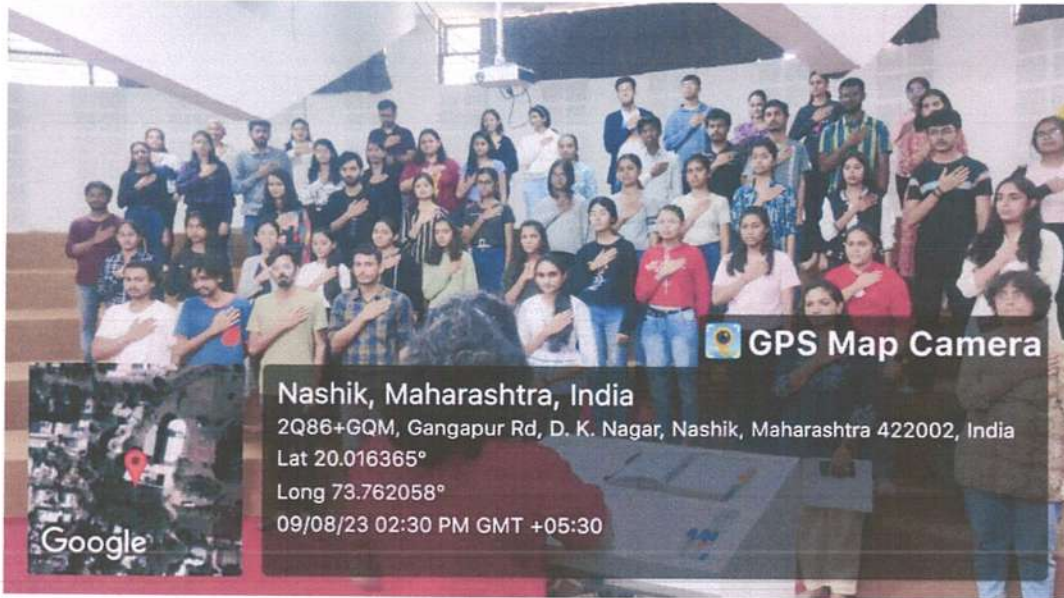
