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Art and architecture of Jogeshwari temple, Devalane, Tal. Satana, Dist. Nasik

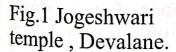

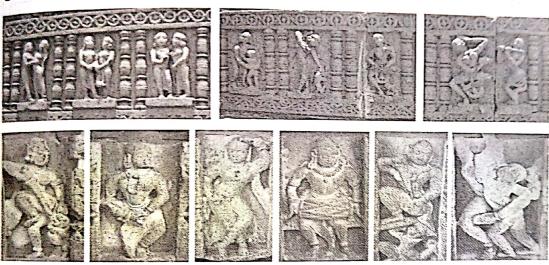


Fig.15 – Erotic sculptures, sursundari on external wall
